These small changes may have a very positive impact on children's learning and social behaviours.

Year of Mercy

Pope Francis has a vision for the church, he refers to it as, '*The Church of Mercy*' and his hope is that it becomes a healing force in the world simply by communicating and demonstrating the mercy of God. We have been told often enough that, '*we are the church*', so then, what is our responsibility? What does mercy look like? How do we show the face of mercy in a world desperately in need? The following is an excerpt from an article by Vanita Wright who writes for the digital journal, 'National Catholic Reporter'.

'As I move through my day, how will I live mercifully? What words and actions will express to others around me the mercy that Francis is talking about? My mercy may not show in grand gestures, but perhaps I can consider the following: Mercy gives you his seat on the bus, acting as if he was about to get up anyway rather than making you feel that he is doing you a favour. Mercy does not let out that sigh -- you know the one -- the wordless disapproval toward the person in the check-out line ahead of you whose card didn't swipe, or whose toddler is having a meltdown. Mercy offers quiet sympathy and does not convey with her body language that this holdup is ruining her day. Sometimes mercy chooses not to send back the food that isn't just right, simply because the waitress looks overwhelmed. When mercy has been wronged, the offended one does not make it difficult for the offender to apologise or ask forgiveness. In fact, mercy does not wait for the other's action but forgives so quickly that the person needing forgiveness is freer to ask for it. Likewise, at work, at home or in the classroom, mercy creates an atmosphere in which a person feels safe enough to admit his mistake or ask a question. Mercy makes a habit of giving others the benefit of the doubt.'

There's more to this insightful article, but I might leave that for our next newsletter, in the interim, I hope that the words above touch you as they have me, and serve to remind us all that *we are the church*, and that makes us... God's face of mercy to the world.

First Reconciliation



This program is ideally for children in Year 5 and above.



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
The program is held once per week on Friday from 3:45pm to 4:45pm.
